









Homes and Studios of the Taos Society of Artists Walking Tour





Although both the Native American and Hispanic communities had been creating artwork for hundreds of years, the Taos Society of Artists was primarily responsible for making this tiny art colony into an international art center. Formed in 1915 as a commercial cooperative, as opposed to a stylistic collective, the group survived until 1927, when internal divisions and the effects of the Great Depression led to its dissolution. During its existence, Society members rose in stature to become icons of the national and international art scenes.

Today, the homes and studios of the ten most prominent members of the Society may be visited on a self-guided walking tour of Taos' Historic District.


